As we begin our 38th year of protecting, enhancing and preserving the South Platte River and its tributaries, I am honored to offer a brief description of how The Greenway Foundation (TGF) has grown and hopefully improved over the last 38 years. TGF was originally challenged with restoring the South Platte River and Cherry Creek in the City and County of Denver (Denver). Our Founder, Joe Shoemaker, was a whiz at getting agreement and support from a diverse group of public and private supporters to move forward with the reclamation of our River. Trails, bridges, water quality and recreation features, youth education, and community events have all been a part of the mix throughout the ensuing decades. 2012 will provide even more opportunities to enhance Denver and the surrounding communities, as well as improve life for many of our upstream and downstream water users.

Looking ahead to 2012, TGF's involvement with the River Vision Implementation Plan (RVIP) is moving forward in grand style. RVIP's recommendations, in partnership with Denver, include short, mid, and long term projects that will not only further enhance the South Platte River, but also provide increased opportunities to further develop properties alongside and near our River. Hopefully you've had a chance to witness the revitalization of the Central Platte Valley adjacent to Confluence Park, TGF'S first project. New residential, retail, and commercial establishments have given this historic area of Denver a new and revitalized look and feel. Both local citizens and visiting tourists are able to enjoy the River corridor, including its adjacent parks and trails right in the heart of Denver. The recommendations within RVIP will provide additional opportunities to enjoy the South Platte River as well as its surrounding amenities as TGF moves forward with our partners to accomplish these plans.

The Chatfield Reallocation Project continues to offer the opportunity for TGF to be involved with numerous South Platte River stakeholders in multiple counties through the efforts to increase water storage (and, thereby, downstream delivery) within Chatfield Reservoir. By working closely with all of the parties involved, TGF has been engaged in discussions with our Congressional Delegation, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as well as many other related entities to support this critically important project. By increasing the amount of water available in Chatfield Reservoir, and therefore for the South Platte River downstream of the Reservoir, the recreational and environmental quality of our River, as it flows through the Denver Metro area, will be greatly increased. This will also result in more water for related municipal and agricultural needs.

RVIP, the Live-Life-Smiling Mile High Mile, PURE, Chatfield Reallocation, Confluence Concerts, Riversweep are all a sampling of TGF's ventures. And the list goes on! This local, yet nationally recognized, non-profit has a great deal on its plate for the coming year as well as the near term and long term future. The energetic dedication and enthusiasm of TGF's Board of Directors, along with TGF's collective staff are up to the challenge!

THE SOUTH PLATTE RIVER

YESTERDAY, TODAY, AND TOMORROW

On June 16, 1965 fourteen inches of rain fell in just over four hours sending a torrent of water down the South Platte River through the heart of Denver. The resulting flood was the most devastating natural disaster in Denver's history. Homes, bridges, and businesses were destroyed and washed away. As the floodwaters began to recede, debris littered the South Platte River from city limit to city limit.

In 1974, Denver Mayor Bill McNichols appointed State Senator Joe Shoemaker as chairman of the Platte River Development Committee (PRDC). The Committee was charged with initiating the reclamation of the South Platte River. As the work along the South Platte began, it quickly became evident that funding from the city alone would not be sufficient for the ambitious reclamation goals of the PRDC.

In 1976, the PRDC evolved into The Greenway Foundation (TGF), a 501(c)3 non-profit organization focused on the solicitation and obtainment of public and private contributions with a mission to revitalize, restore, and reclaim the South Platte River as an environmental, recreational, cultural, scientific, and historical amenity for the city of Denver.

Over the course of the last 38 years, TGF has partnered with numerous public, private, and philanthropic organizations to collectively create over 100 miles of riverside trails, over 100 acres of riverside parks and natural areas, over 100,000 linear feet of water quality and recreational improvements with the River, and invest over \$100 Million in green improvements along the South Platte River and its tributaries in Metro Denver. This ongoing commitment to Denver's greatest natural resource has resulted in over \$10 Billion of economic benefits to the areas adjacent to the River.





THE NEXT STEPS

A RENEWED VISION FOR DENVER'S SOUTH PLATTE RIVER

CHATFIELD REALLOCATION PROJECT

- Additional water storage at Chatfield Reservoir
- Coordinated release of water downstream of the Reservoir for better water quality and recreational opportunities
- Cooperative effort with more than 30 entities including upstream and downstream water providers, in-stream interests, 14 state and local government stakeholders, and 7 nonprofit organizations

Since 2004, The Greenway Foundation (TGF) has been an active participant and supporter of the Chatfield Reservoir Reallocation Study and Project, and serves as the administrator for the water user coalition escrow account. TGF participates in excursions to Washington, DC each year to visit with the Colorado congressional delegation, the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Army (Civil Works), USACE Headquarters, and the White House Office of Management and Budget to support funding and report on progress regarding the Project.

PROTECT OUR URBAN RIVER ENVIRONMENT (PURE)

- New initiative focused on creating a systemic shift in how the citizens of Metro Denver connect trash in their community to the resulting trash in the South Platte River
- Goals and objectives include the reduction of trash in the River through a large-scale focus on awareness, prevention, and removal



The overall goal of PURE is to improve water quality in the South Platte River as it runs through Metro Denver. Using information and education planning, PURE hopes to raise public awareness and commitment to keeping trash – the most visible form of pollution – out of the River. Water quality improvement will, TGF believes, come from continued hard work by PURE and many others to reduce all forms of pollution in the River.

Funding and support for PURE has been obtained from the City and County of Denver, City of Sheridan, the City of Englewood, Colorado Dept. of Public Health and Environment, the Environmental Protection Agency, Kenney Brothers Foundation, Denver Trout Unlimited, and Confluence Kayaks. This collective support will allow TGF to initiate the education and outreach components of the PURE agenda along with initiating efforts to determine the sources of larger amounts of trash in River as well as work with the Urban Drainage and Flood Control District to inventory the items found.

Over the course of the year, TGF and the City and County of Denver initiated the formation of a working group, including Overland neighborhood residents, to interact with representatives from the Trustees of Colorado's Natural Resource Damages Funds program (NRDs). The focus of this effort was to develop a request from TGF to obtain \$1.7 Million of NRDs funding to help restore water quality, habitat, and riparian areas along a two-mile stretch of the South Platte River in south Denver.

The funds were awarded to TGF and will be used to implement projects identified in the River Vision Implementation Plan (RVIP) to restore, protect, and enhance riparian habitat in the Grant Frontier, Pasquinel's Landing, and Overland Pond areas. In addition, TGF secured a \$250,000 award from Colorado's Water Supply Reserve Account for the preliminary design efforts of the RVIP recommendations within this area, as well as a \$65,000 Fishing is Fun grant from Colorado Parks & Wildlife for further enhancements to Overland Pond. TGF is grateful to all those who helped obtain the needed funds to make these improvements a reality.

RIVER VISION IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

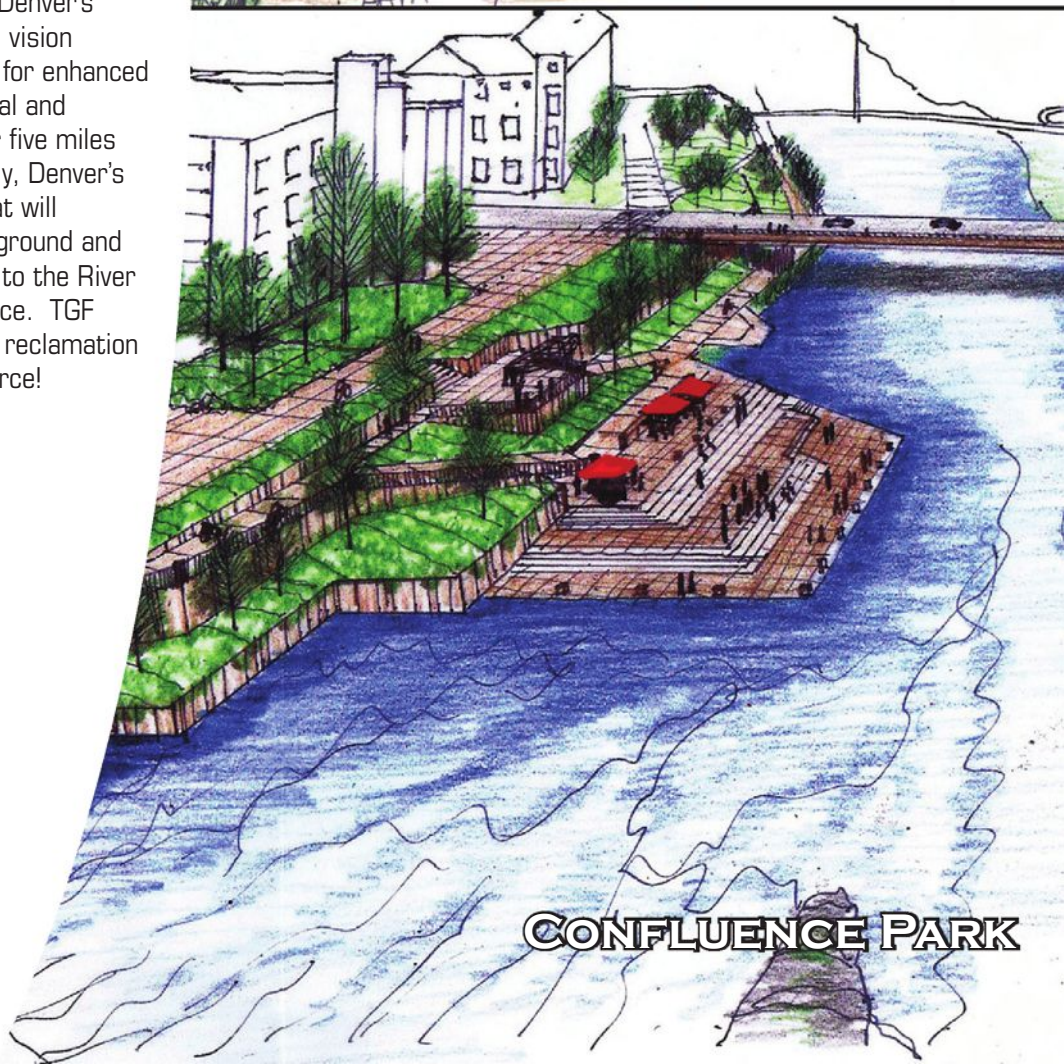
With the completion of the River Vision Implementation Plan (RVIP) in late 2010, the focus of this newest endeavor to further reclaim and enhance Denver's South Platte River has evolved toward obtaining the needed funds to begin turning "vision" into "reality".

Projects on Weir Gulch (within the Sun Valley area) and Confluence Park are already underway, and fundraising efforts for all five priority project areas are in high gear. As planning gives way to implementation, TGF and its numerous public and private partners hope to see construction and land acquisition underway in the coming year.

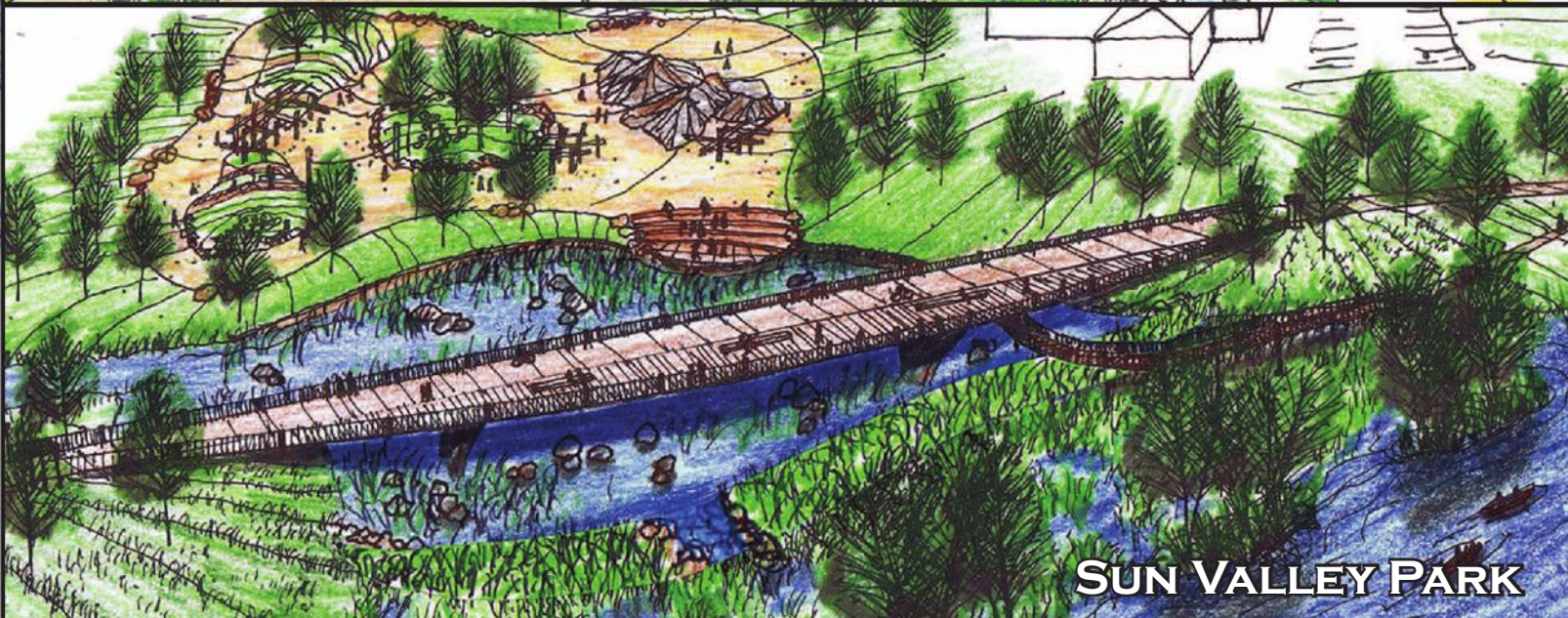
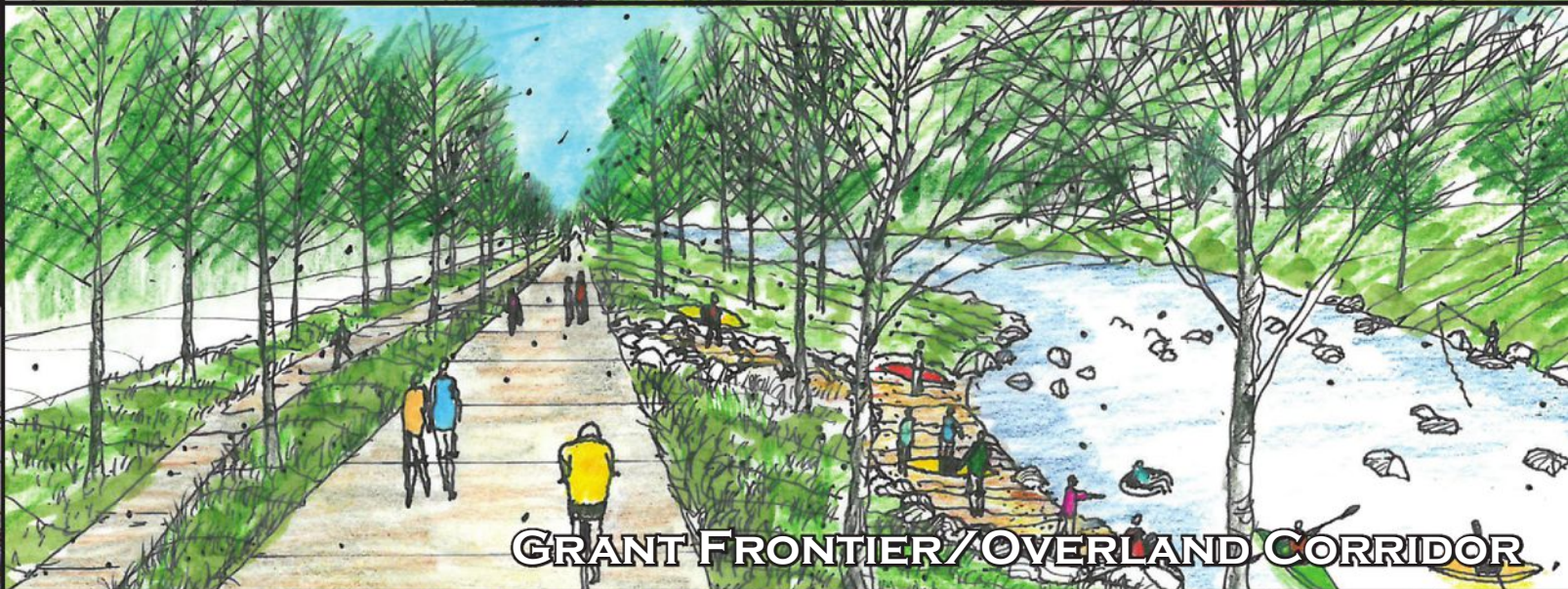
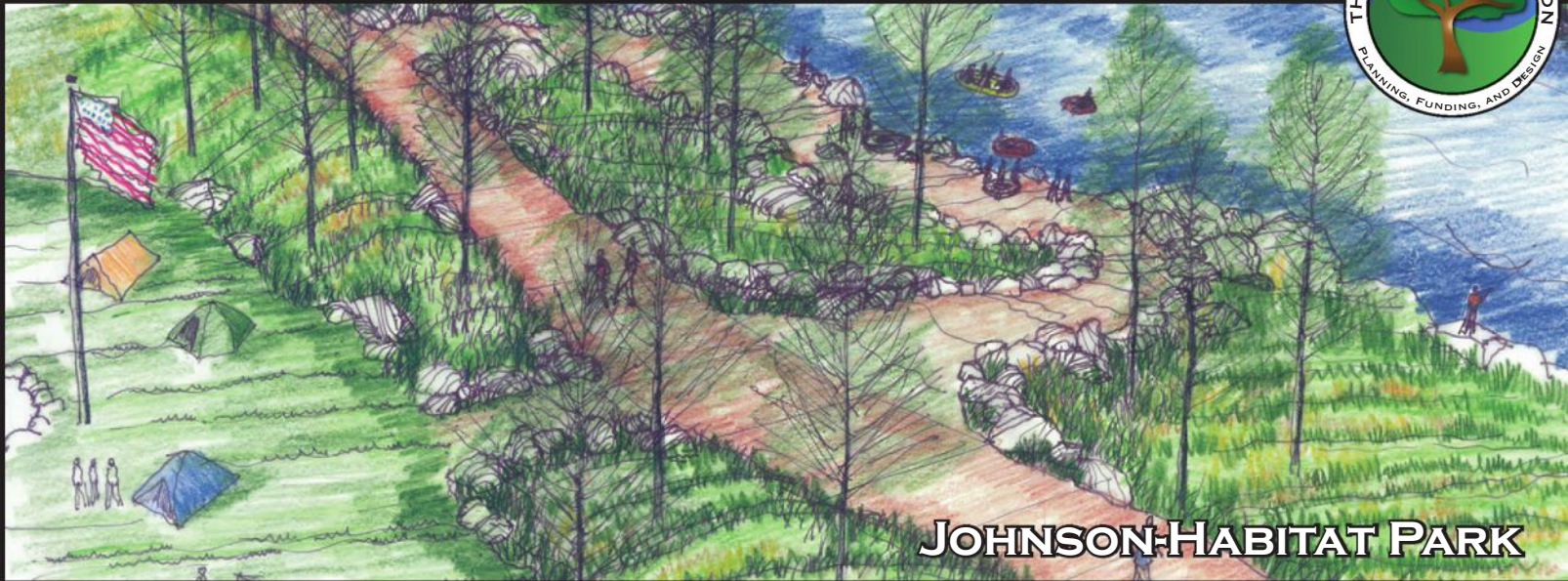
From water quality and aquatic habitat improvements, to outdoor learning spaces and playgrounds, the next evolution of Denver's South Platte River has begun. This vision includes: better trails and bridges for enhanced connectivity, riparian, environmental and recreational improvements to over five miles of the South Platte River, and finally, Denver's newest outdoor education park that will include our city's first urban campground and obtainment of properties adjacent to the River to allow for much needed park space. TGF remains dedicated to the on-going reclamation of Denver's greatest natural resource!

EXCURSIONS

The Greenway Foundation's SPREE Program continues to grow in new and exciting ways. During the 2010-2011 school year, SPREE provided excursions and weekend events along the South Platte River for over 6,500 elementary school children as well as over 1,000 parents and adult chaperones. In addition, the SPREE staff worked hard to strengthen the curriculum by aligning it with Colorado's newest State Education Standards, helping teachers better connect classroom material to their SPREE outdoor experiences.

In addition to the excursions for kindergarten through fifth grade-aged students, SPREE expanded its interaction with high school students from throughout Denver. In the fall of 2011, five high school aged students became certified as environmental educators and helped the SPREE adult staff teach elementary school aged children on several different excursions. This growth of the award winning River Ranger Program is transforming it from an exclusively summer program into a year round learning opportunity for Denver youth. In 2012, SPREE will also introduce two completely new excursions to its programming list. In an effort to keep programs up-to-date and aligned with state standards for education and environmental education, SPREE developed new excursions for the early childhood education (ECE) and kindergarten trips. These new programs include more hands-on activities that allow learners to see, hear, and feel the different components of nature and start to become familiar with their local environment – "nature in their own backyard".



SUMMER CAMP

In 2011, over 40 1st through 6th grade students joined SPREE at Johnson-Habitat Park for two weeks of SPREE Summer Camp. During the first week, campers became SPREE Force Special Agents and completed top-secret missions from Chompers, SPREE's beaver mascot, to investigate how people can reduce the amount of trash that ends up in the South Platte River. Through outdoor exploration, nature games, recycled crafts, and more, campers learned all about composting and even took home a miniature worm-composting bin they made from repurposed household materials. Camp activities lead participants from awareness to action, building the knowledge and skills needed to become stewards of the environment.

In 2012, SPREE is expanding its summer camp program to a full eleven weeks of outdoor fun along the South Platte River. Campers will train as Special Agents by learning about the environment along the River. They will defeat the trash monster, and the couch potato, go on a Denver Safari, and even train as Art Ninjas. Crafts, games and activities will fill a summer with fun!

GREENWAY RIVER RANGERS

The Greenway Foundation's (TGF) River Ranger Program is designed to provide meaningful opportunities for high school and college-aged youth to explore careers in environmental education and related fields.

Last summer, TGF employed 15 youth for over ten weeks as River Rangers. The River Rangers were exposed to several different environmental careers through work experience, site visits, and guest speakers. They completed at least 20 hours of environmental education training while working toward certification as environmental educators. They put their new knowledge and skills to work by teaching over 400 elementary age students at SPREE summer programs. The River Rangers worked 28 hours at Overland Pond Park removing invasive species, beaver proofing Cottonwood Trees, improving trails, cleaning up trash, and providing other maintenance for the park facilities.

The River Ranger program won an award for Excellence in Environmental Education from the Colorado Alliance for Environmental Education this year as the "Best New Program" in the state of Colorado.





The success of the River Ranger Program has allowed TGF to expand it from a summer program to a year round program. Youth now have opportunities to learn and become teachers for students on SPREE excursions.

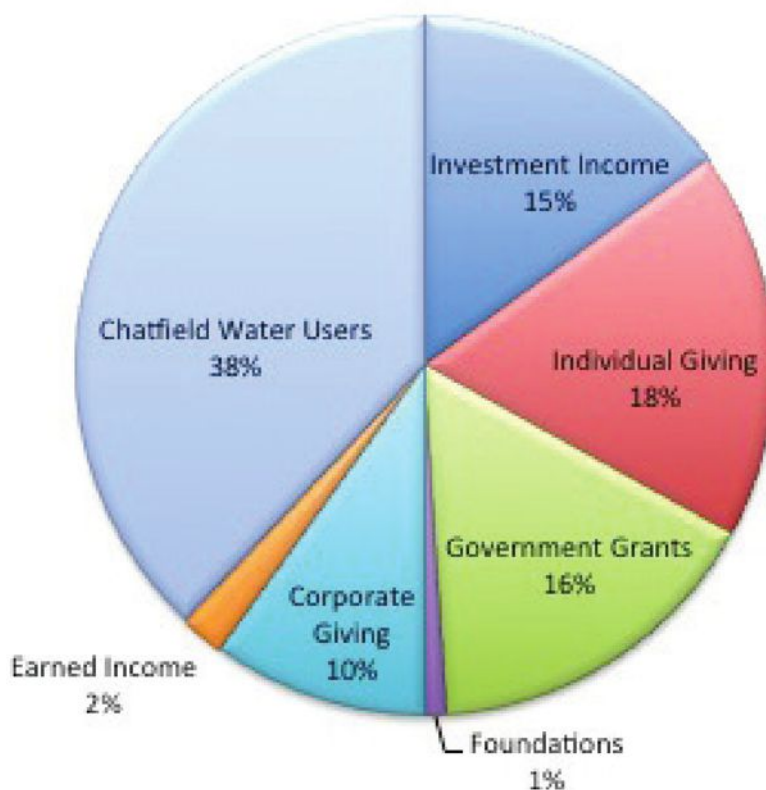

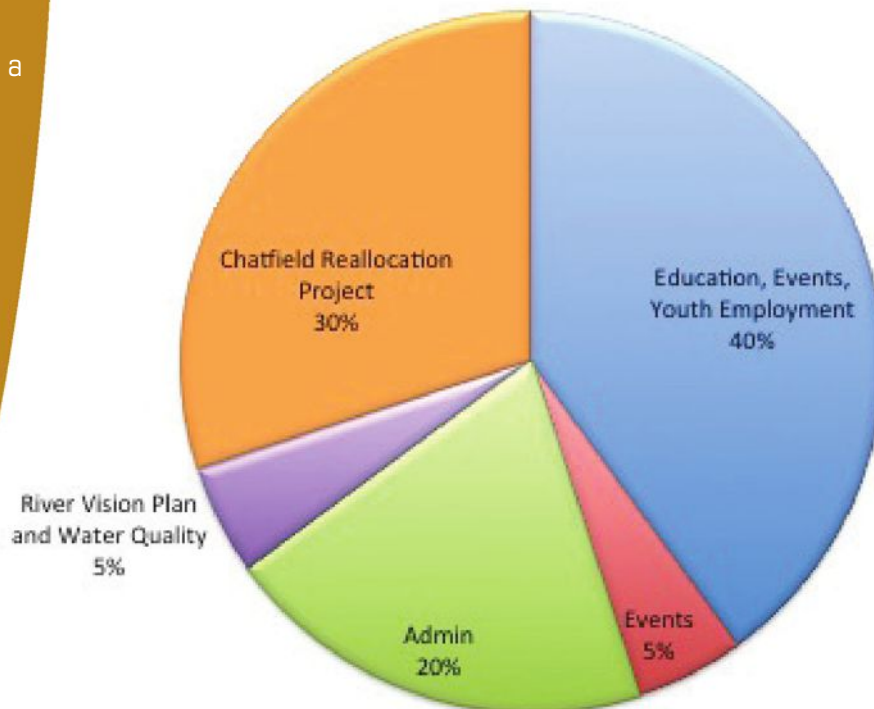
